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Summary of findings

Overall findings

There is a positive response from members towards the College throughout the survey.

Members rate the College highly as a membership organisation; **79%** of members think it is excellent, very good or good.

There are no significant differences between clinical oncologists and clinical radiologists in their perceptions of the College.

Key words members use to describe the College are 'professional', 'educational' but also 'London-centric'.

78% of members agree that the College fulfils its aim of improving the quality of care in clinical oncology and clinical radiology for the benefit of patients and the public.

Member communications

The majority of members are satisfied with the communications they receive from the RCR.

Almost a third of members would like to interact with the College through social media in future.

Clinical radiology and clinical oncology as professions

The majority of members (**63%**) agree that it is important to share their views on policy issues with the College but 1 in 4 (**27%**) are unsure how to do this.

Raising the profile of the specialties and increasing external influence are key challenges that the membership would like the College to address.

Members want the College to offer more professional learning and development activities.

Member engagement

The main reason for members continuing their College membership is to access professional resources.

909 members are willing to be contacted about getting involved in College work.

Lack of time, inconvenient location and high financial cost are the main reasons why members do not attend RCR events.
